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European Youth Exchange

Major Funding for Ballyfermot Youth Service from Europe and from Edgar Otto Thedens Bequest Fund

Ballyfermot Youth Service kicked off our Summer Programme this year with visits to eight European countries, Spain ,Malta, Italy, Poland, Norway, Belgium, Sweden and the Caribbean Island of Martinique. 2009 was a record year for participation of young people from Ballyfermot in the European Youth in Action Programme. Over 80 young people took part in Youth Exchanges to various European countries organised by Ballyfermo Youth Service. In addition we played host to a further 50 young people here in Ballyfermot from Italy, France and Poland in August . The ages of participants were from 14 to 20 years. The exchanges have involved young people participating in : drama, arts, music, sport, peer education and leadership programmes. The main priorities of the Youth in Action Programme are:

European citizenship

Participation of young people

Cultural Diversity

Inclusion of young people with fewer opportunities

Every Exchange is different, some are between seven and ten days duration. The basis is that the young people take part in a programme of activities that reflect the priorities of the Youth In Action Programme. The funding for these programmes comes directly from the European Union and covers 70% of travel cost, there is also an allowance for food, accommodation, and activities.





The most difficult aspect for the young person is the fear of the unknown. Would they enjoy the experience? Could they get over the language barriers? Would they be comfortable around other young people from a different country? Our experience has being that once the young person gets over their initial nervousness they fully enter the experience.

Youth Pass

All participants taking part in the Youth in Action Programme have the right to receive recognition for their participation and learning which can be used in their future lives. The Youthpass Certificate has recently been developed for this purpose

In addition to the European funding Ballyfermot Youth Service also received €18,000 funding from the Edgar Otto Thedens Bequest Fund. Edgar left a sum of money to the Irish government that was to be used to encourage young people to travel throughout Europe and develop friendships with other young people.

The Youth Programme has been a tremendous boost to Ballyfermot Youth Service it has enabled us to encourage young people to participate in a broader range of programmes and it has acted as a recruitment tool for us. We now have a waiting list of young people who want to take part in programmes.

We have seen the positives for young people from Ballyfermot; it has opened their eyes to new communities and has taken some of them out of the mindset that the world is only where they live. When we look back on the experiences so many of our young people have had, it's being amazing.

The manager of Ballyfermot Youth Service praised the staff of BYS who have put a lot of time and energy into applying for funding, making contacts with European partners and preparing the young people for their travel.

Action 2 EVS European Volunteer Worker

European Voluntary Service (EVS) supports transnational voluntary service of young people, both within and outside the European Union. The activities take place in a country other than a volunteer's country of residence. It is unpaid, nonprofit-making and full time for a given period. It benefits the community. EV\$ is open to all young people between the age of 18 to 30, regardless of their background or whether they are legally resident in a programme country or in a partner country. The Europeans Union provides finance to cover travel, food and accommodation along with a small allowance each month. Exploring the Values of Rugby & Sport Belgum Aug 2009

In Aug 2009, 40 young people met in the little village of Al Vile Cinse in Southern Beligum. The Youth Exchange was centered around a small rugby club (Coq Mosan) and there were groups from Beligum Ireland (Ballyfermot), France and Finland

The theme of the Exchange was to explore the values of rugby such as: leadership, team spirit, courage, sportsmanship, and friendship. The Youth Exchange also looked at how sport can be used as a tool for intergration in society and how you can transfer these values into your own life. Two of the groups, Ireland and Finland were not from rugby backgrounds.

The Youth Exchange started by mixing all the young people together and having training sessions each day for two hours. There was also workshops on the history of rugby and its relevence to modern society, the various traditions and heritage of the different countries were rugby is played. This was followed later in the week by having a full game against each other.

The young people also got a chance to try a number of other sports including Gaelic football which was faciliated by the group from Ballyfermot, in addition we did swimming, rope climbing and a nature trail walk through bogland. A visit to Francorchamps race course were Formaula One takes place was also included.

The group visited Maastrict, Achen ,Liege and Brugge taking in the culture of each city and seeing how each country provides leisure type activities for their young people



The experience also allowed young people to learn about each other's lives, by living together, learning about different aspects of life and other cultures. Given that one of the priorities of the Youth in Action Programme is to combat racism and xenophobia in Europe, this Youth Exchange allowed the young people to experience how taking part in sports can be used as a positive activity to break down barriers.

BYS Open New Centre in Wicklow

For the past three years Ballyfermot Youth Service have been developing our own outdoor education centre in County Wicklow. The centre is based outside Blessington on the road to Glendalough and was previously operated by Catholic Youth Care as Oakwood. Following their decision to hand this centre back to Coillte, who own the premises, we approached them and agreed that BYS would take over the lease. The location of the centre is ideal for many activities and as it is based in the Garden of Ireland many natural amenities such as: lakes, forests, walking trails, kayaking activities and mountain biking trails.

The centre was in very poor condition and needed major refurbishment to bring it up to modern standards. BYS appointed architects Kearney Merriman and set about designing a centre that would be able to be used for outdoor sports activities and for hosting international exchanges. The centre can now sleep up to 24 persons and each bedroom has its own bathroom facilities. There is a common sitting room and modern kitchen facilities. Major work was conducted on insulating the property with double glazed windows ,doors and installing a new central heating system.

Ballyfermot Youth Service would like to thank the many individuals and organisations who helped us with the project. To our Funders Rapid Ballyfermot, Dublin City Council, CDYSB and the Local Drugs Task Force for their assistance with this project. And to Coillte and Catholic Youth Care who agreed to transfer the lease to us. Also to our builder Elmleaf Construction and Architect Brian Merriman We look forward to using the centre and continuing our work with young people giving them a positive experience of living in the country.












d.o. i.t. 4 you



Starting in October 09 a youth democracy project entitled 'd.o. i.t. 4 you' – 'think glob@lly, act loc@lly', which stands for 'democratic opinions informatic technologies for youth' is starting in both Ireland and Italy. There are four organisations involved in the project: Ballyfermot Youth Service, Limerick Youth Service, Tortona & Tropea. The project, which is the first of its kind is about youth participation, in particular about their right to be listened to on the matters that concern them and on all issues that have to do with their communities. The main aim is to improve the relationship between young people and local administration (politicians), to gain their trust and be involved in their decisions.



The organisations want to experiment with new technologies and encourage young people to use them to express their opinions on certain issues. This will be done through SMS (texts), shared website, social networking sites and other technologies not normally used by young people in this way. Through this approach each group of 10 - 12 young people hope to gather information from hundreds of local young people and present them to local officials alongside a strategy to take action on identified issues. The project will also involve two international events one in Tortona (Italy) and one in Ballyfermot where all the groups will meet to share their experiences of the project and work on a wider European issue.

Through this partnership the young people involved hope to improve understanding of the issues that matter to young people across both countries and work together to have their voices heard and valued.

Filory Youth Exchange

In August BYS hosted a Youth Exchange in Dublin and Killary Adventure Centre in Leenane Co Galway involving fifty young people, they were from groups from Poland, Italy, France and Ballyfermot.

The theme for the Exchange was Fashion, Meria and Sport.we were looking at how fashion and sport are interlinked and how the media can be used to influence our decisions to purchase certain styles and labels. We used sport as the tool to break down the barriers between the different nationalities and to overcome any lanague difficulities.

The week started in Dublin where we began to get to know each other and give our guests the opportunity to experience our Irish food and customs. After two days in Dublin we set out for Killary. The journey there took us through the heart of Ireland so our guests could see and appreciate the beautiful landscapes on the way.

In the mornings we had workshops about fashion and art skills where we planned the International Fashion Parade for the last night. During the workshops we made tee shirts, designed shoes and produced a series of advertising postors which could be used to sell products and services

In the afternoons we experienced an exciting range of outdoor activities including rope, swing, ringo and laser war with the instructors from Killary.

In the evenings each country hosted its own national night. In this way we learned about their cultures. We got to know about each countries customs and traditional fashions and got to taste some of their traditional foods. As we were based in the west of Ireland we spent a day in Galway where we went shopping and visited the sights of the city.

Everybody had a great time on the exchange and mixed well with each other. The last night when we had the International Fashion Parade was great fun and we learned lots about fashion and one another. The young people from Ballyfermot were very good hosts and made extra efford to communicate with people from the different cultures and were very tolerant and helpful with people who did not have english as their first language. Towards the end of the exchange you could hear a new type of language being spoken, which was a mixture of all our languages together and the true meaning of being a European citzen was achieved.
